editorial philosophy

In order to represent the students of Lincoln College Preparatory Academy, the Lincolnian staff chose the theme *Perception* for the 2018 yearbook to portray the diverse viewpoints and perspectives of each and every Lincoln student. *Perception* allows us to play with color and light through optical illusions, which embodies the concept that there is no one way to look at things; everything has endless points of views and interpretations.

The staff chose fonts that play around with contrasts and differences, from thick and thin to sharp and round, to represent the differences we have at Lincoln. We also incorporated lines and shapes that provide connections between different content to highlight the student body's precious moments. The color scheme is predominantly cool-toned, however, we provided a vivid pink and a soft neutral to provide balance within the palette.

All content, whether it be provided by a photographer, writer, or designer, required preciseness and pushed our boundaries. Now, our hard work, taken from hundreds of standpoints, is able to flow together using all of our thematic elements that meld us under the theme of *Perception*.

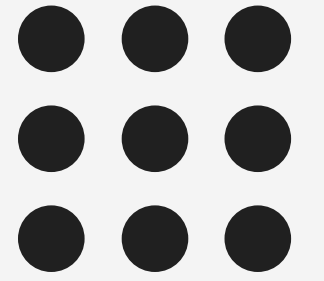

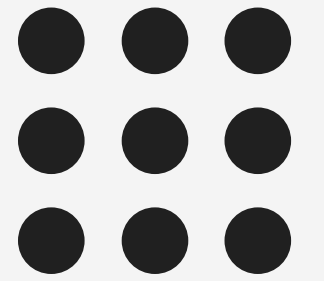

First sentence of a story that draws the reader in



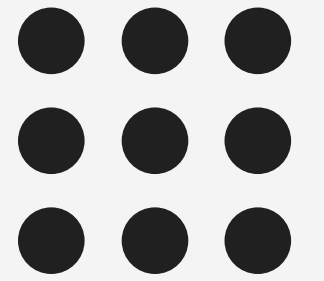
TRANSITIONS

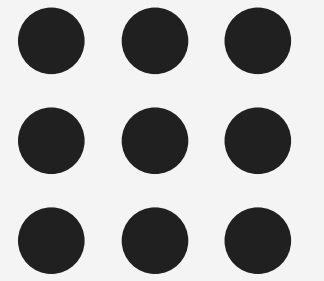

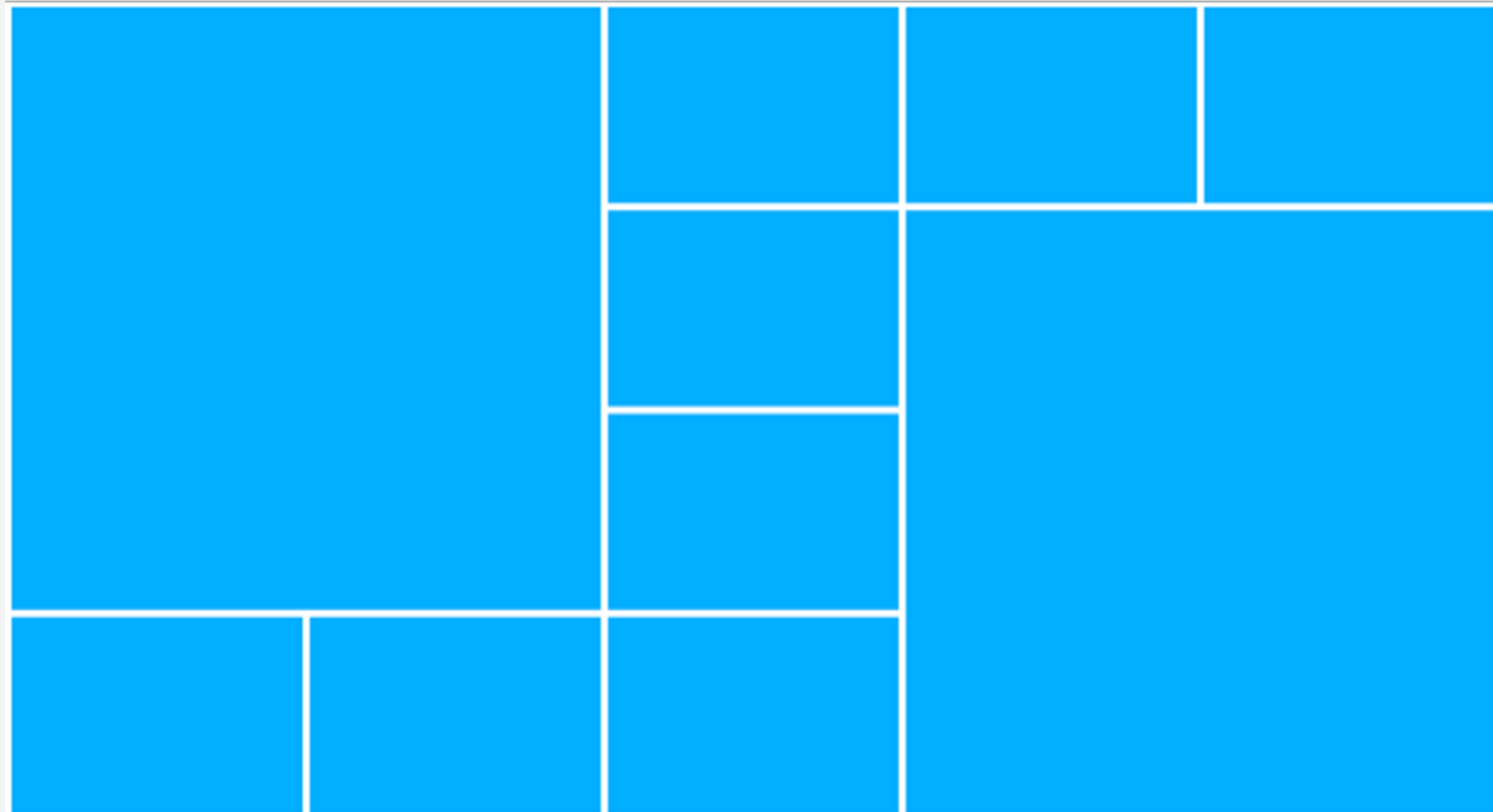


A phrase or opinion that is overused and shows a **lack of original thought**

Dividing your spread into boxes using a grid method. Filling each box with content and secondary coverage.

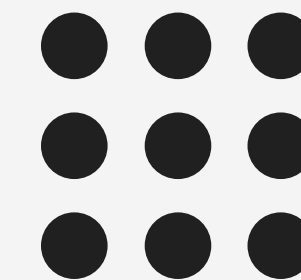


EMPHASIS

Method used to attract attention in the design



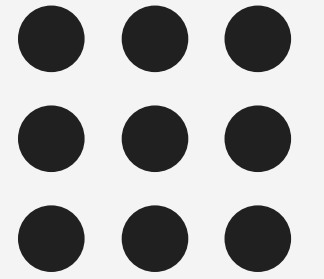
VISUAL MONOTONY

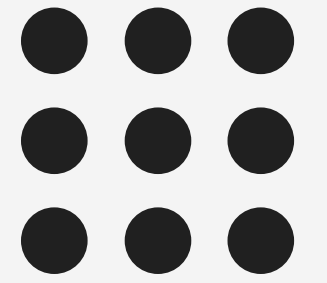
It is the portion of a page left unmarked

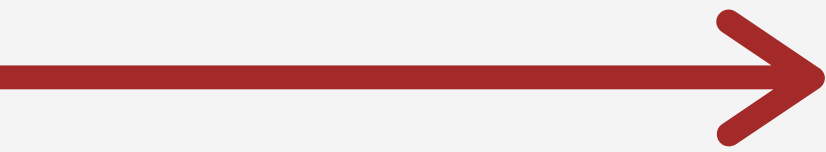
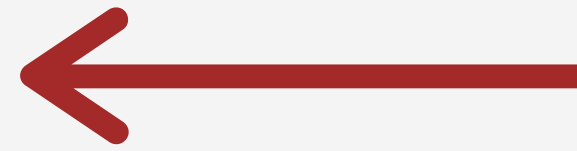
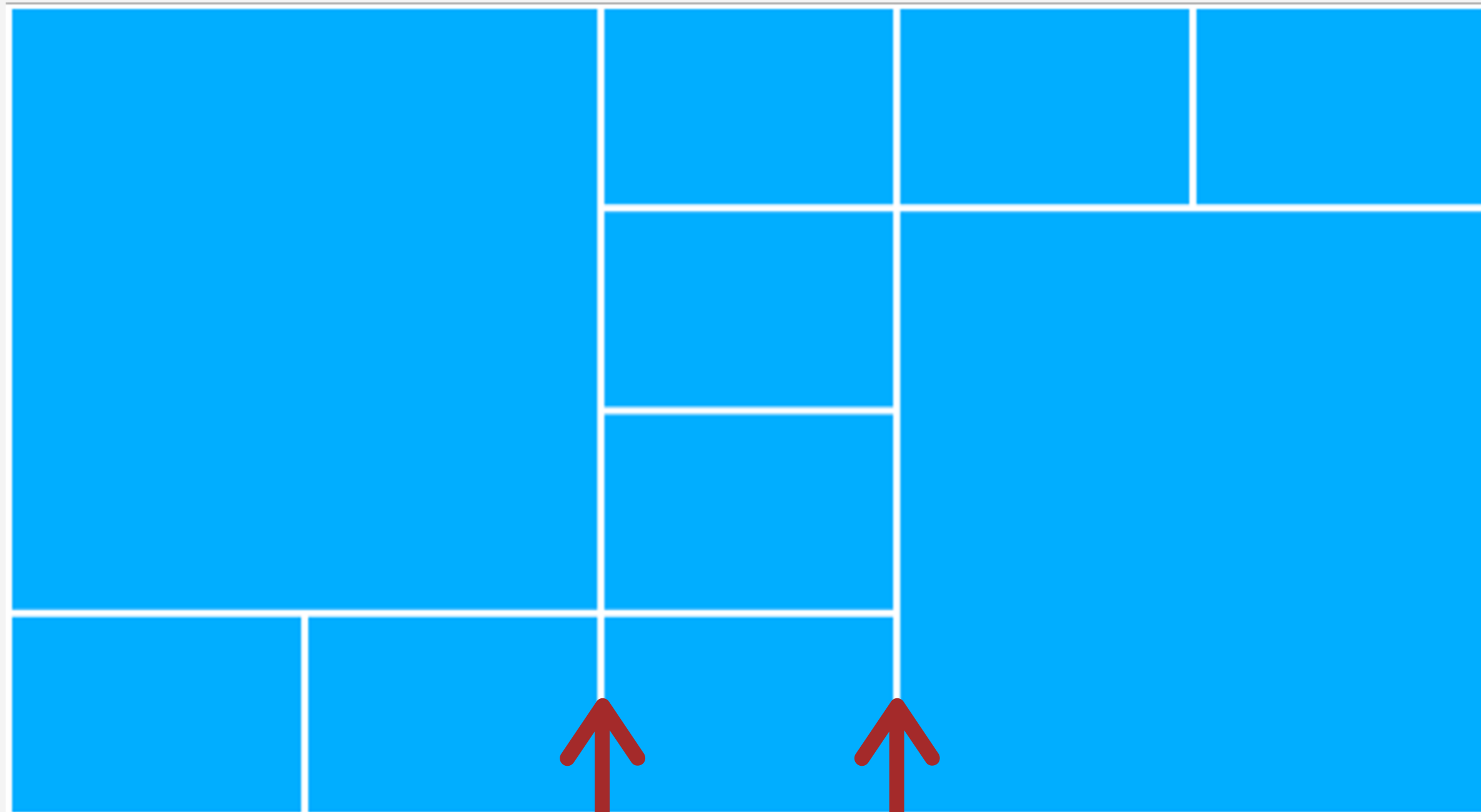

MARGINS



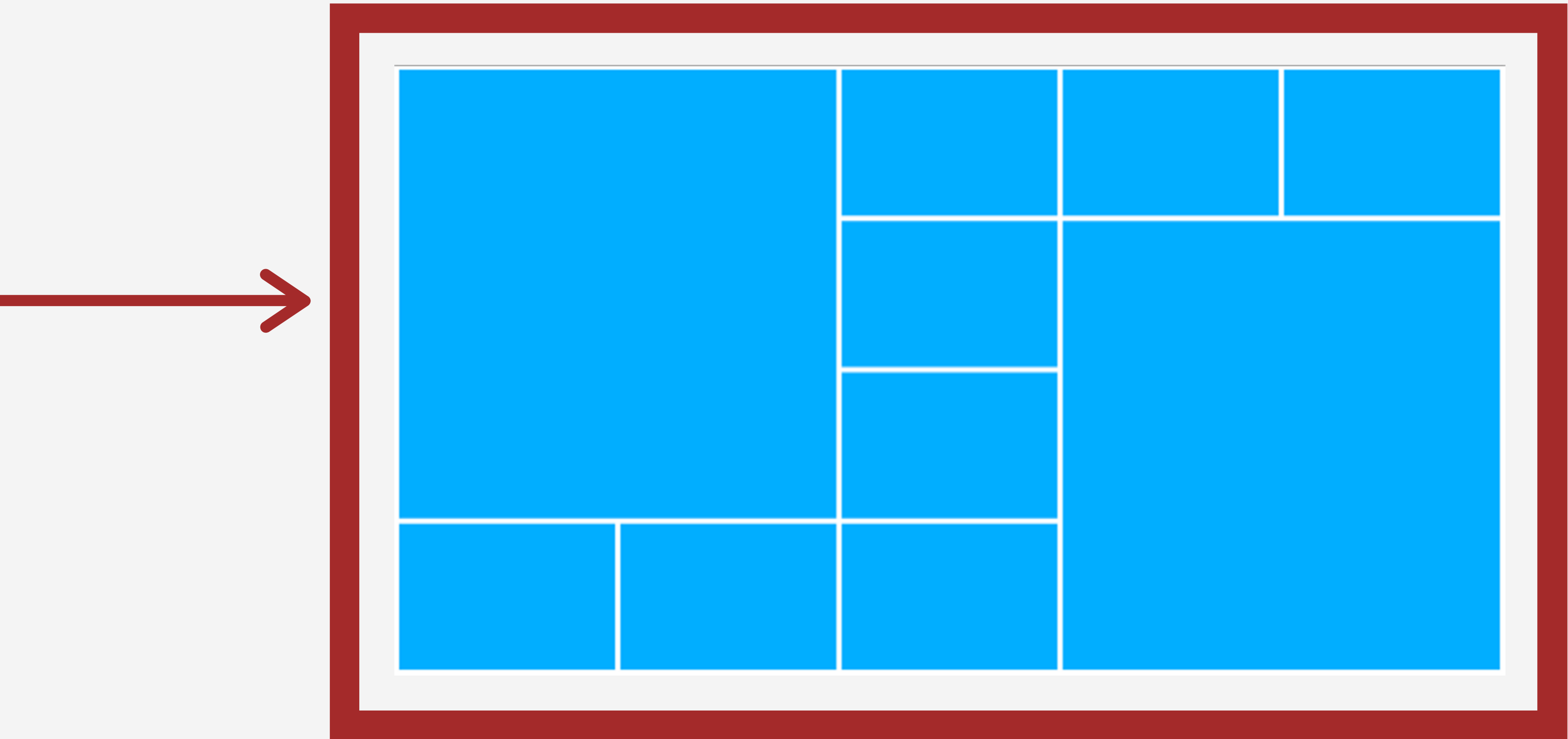
Internal: white space between all of the elements on a spread



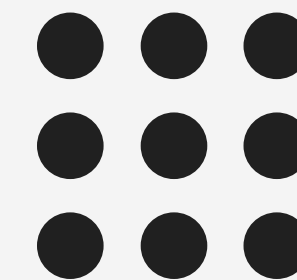

Removal of unwanted outer areas from a photograph

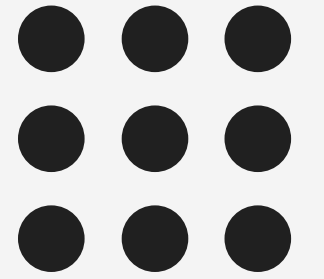

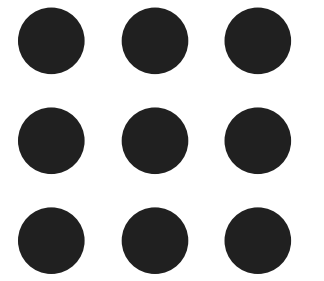
